At the beginning of this term we were pleased to welcome an experienced team from the Education Review Office (ERO) to help us evaluate the school's performance. As a new principal I am grateful for the clarity and outside perspective that ERO brought. It is clear that, although the 2017 achievement data shows the majority of students achieved well at NCEA, the school is not yet achieving equitable and excellent outcomes for all. In particular, the school needs to do more to accelerate the learning of Maaori, Pacifica and other students who need this. ERO have identified a number of processes and practices that we need to urgently review and improve to achieve the outcomes that we all want to see for our rangatahi. The full report will be published early next term. In the meantime we look forward to working with ERO over the next one to two years to address each of the issues that have been identified during the review.
