Weave the people, create success

This is the new school vision statement, displayed at the front of our newly adopted Strategic Plan. One term into 2025 it is timely to look into our vision for the school and to explain how we are tracking towards this.



Weaving the people (whiria te taangata) speaks to the importance of community and belonging. Here at Pukekohe High School, 1900 students and approximately 160 staff come together daily in the pursuit of education. It is our responsibility, as a school, to provide an environment where all young people feel that they have a place in the school community. This can occur through learning that takes place in class, involvement in the wide variety of co-curricular activities that are on offer, participation in leadership opportunities and engagement with community initiatives. Each of these areas enable students to feel a sense of connection with our kura and the people within it - to weave the people together.

How are we going here? As you will see later in the newsletter, our attendance rates are tracking up. More students are at school more often indicating that our rangatahi want to engage with their learning and feel that school is a positive place to be. Our co-curricular programme continues to grow in the breadth and depth of activities on offer as does our recently expanded student leadership (council) system and the variety of activities that these groups are leading.

Creating success (whiria te angituu) speaks to what can occur when a school creates an environment where young people feel connected. Success, in a school setting, looks like different things to different people. Academic success is the most obvious example of a positive outcome in a school setting. The development of positive attributes, attitudes and traits in young people is another way that success can be obtained. The promotion and celebration of our school MANA values is a clear example of the importance that we place on this at Pukekohe High School.

How are we tracking here? While it is too early to analyse NCEA achievement rates, we are optimistic that the developments in the NCEA literacy and numeracy supports in school will have a positive impact on levels of achievement later in the year. The fact that hundreds of our students have been recognised throughout the term for exemplifying our MANA Values speaks to the impact that the focus on these values is having.

I would like to commend all students who have started the year with the attitude of taking ownership of their education and aiming for success in whatever form this might look like for them. The school, and staff, are working hard to ensure that our place is one where everyone is catered for. To our community, some of whom are acknowledged later in the newsletter, thank you for getting behind our school and for backing us with support - be it in expertise, time, financial contribution or other.

To everyone, enjoy a well-deserved first term break and we look forward to seeing you back for the beginning of term 2.


Akoranga | Learning Council Update

Ako | Quality Teaching and Learing

Internal Assessment | Chemistry | Titration Day

3SCHE students are carrying out volumetric analysis to collect data for their internal assessment. They are required to find a trend in the concentration of Vitamin C in a sample with respect to increase in temperature. The experiment shows the chemistry of how Vit C degenerates with increase in temperature. This will give students a practical idea of how to store, cook and use produce that contains Vit C to get the maximum benefit out of it.

To calculate the concentration of Vit C, students need to carry out volumetric analysis to get a titre volume of Vit C. Vit C solution, heated at different temperatures is titrated with potassium iodate in the presence of hydrochloric acid, potassium iodide and starch indicator to get the end point. The practical requires special skills in using titration equipment such as burettes and pipettes, checking for reliability, reducing errors and being very precise and organised. Students work in groups of 3 where each student is required to demonstrate their skills. The collection of data takes most of the day.

This chemistry standard shows students the application of chemistry in the real world.



Junior (Year 9 and 10) Curriculum Review

Last year we began a detailed and thorough review of our year 9 and 10 curriculum structure and content. The process began with in-depth staff and student consultation surveys and focus interviews along with a review of current global and New Zealand research on curriculum design and timetable structures.

We now invite parents, whaanau and caregivers to complete our community consultation survey here Pukekohe High School Year 9 and 10 Curriculum Consultation. Following this we will develop a set of curriculum design principles that reflect current NZ curriculum documentation, research and community, staff and student voice to ensure we are meeting the diverse needs of all of our students.

We envision a staged approach to implementing curriculum and timetable changes, with some changes coming into effect in 2026 and full implementation in 2027. We will continue to update you on our progress and any decisions that have been made to curriculum and timetable design. We thank you in advance for taking the time to provide us with feedback.

LEAD Connect – University of Waikato

Three Year 13 students are taking part in the Leadership Academy at The University of Waikato. The purpose of the program is to build confidence to become a strong leader, to empower students to make a positive impact in the world, through growing knowledge, capability and character. The experience will see students completing an Introduction to Leadership university paper.

The first visit to Waikato University located in Hamilton regarding the Waikato Management & Leadership Academy was a great experience for us. The day consisted of getting to know other



passionate students from different schools across the North Island who are interested in the area of management and leadership. There were a lot of smiles and stories shared, and delicious kai catered by the university. The atmosphere and vibes of the day were amazing and full of positivity. We cannot wait to go back to complete the rest of our program! We believe if you are interested in learning more about management and wanting to expand your leadership skills you should sign up and give it a go in 2026!

Literacy and Numeracy Common Assessment Activities

To achieve NCEA level one and above, all students must achieve the NCEA literacy and numeracy co-requisites. These co-requisites are in addition to the 60 credits they must earn to achieve their NCEA qualification. The main pathway to achieving the co-requisites is through the reading, writing and numeracy digital assessments (exams). This year the assessments will be held across New Zealand in weeks 4 and 5 of term two (with a second opportunity in term three, week 8). All students in year 11 and 12 who have not yet achieved this co-requisite will be sitting the exams next term. An opportunity for Year10 students to sit will be had in term 3. A more detailed letter will be sent home at the beginning of term two with all of the arrangements for the week.


Attendance

We continue to monitor and communicate the importance of regular attendance at school for all of our students. The connection between regular attendance (90%+) and academic achievement and wellbeing is strong.


In order to support the school's drive, whaanau are encouraged to keep themselves updated with your child's attendance. This can be accessed most easily through:

The graph below shows the percentage of students in each attendance category by week during term 1. As a school we are aiming to get the number of students attending regularly up to 80%, thereby closing the gap to the government's national attendance targets.



Winter Uniform

Library

In June 2025 the PHS library will celebrate 50 years of life in the current building. The PHS Alumni committee is planning an event to mark this and we will be celebrating in the library with some special activities.

Since 1921 the library has grown from a traditional reading space into a modern, studentcentred resource, serving at the heart of our school community. From card catalogues to digital databases, encyclopaedias to eBooks, the library has evolved to meet the changing needs of students and staff. Our library has empowered generations of students with:

- Access to diverse and engaging reading materials .
- A quiet space for study, reflection, and creativity
- Support in developing strong literacy and research skills
- . Opportunities to explore new ideas and build critical thinking

What remains unchanged is a commitment to fostering a love of reading and lifelong learning, and providing a safe, inclusive space for all.



The library continues to offer a wide range of reading material, at many reading levels, both to support research and assessments, and to read for pleasure. We have:

- books
- magazines
- eBooks
- e-audiobooks
- online databases
- digital encyclopaedias : Britannica and World Book Online.

Our digital resources can all be accessed from home, although World Book Online and the Epic databases do require passwords, which can be requested from

<u>librarian@pukekohehigh.school.nz</u> (Note: passwords will only be provided to current students and caregivers.)

Aakonga may borrow three items at a time, for three weeks. Magazines and study guides can be borrowed for one week. We don't charge fines for overdue books, but aakonga with overdue items will not be permitted to borrow more until the overdue items are returned.

The library is opened every day from about 8.10am (officially 8.30) until 4 pm.
