

YES Pitch Presentation Success for our PHS Entrepreneurs

On 22 May eleven Year 13 **Business** Studies business groups rose to the challenge in a Dragon's Denstyle pitch event as part of Challenge Two in the Young Enterprise Scheme (YES). Each of our groups presented their business ideas to a panel of local business



experts, demonstrating confidence, professionalism and in-depth market knowledge. One standout moment was when a group made a sale during their pitch – such an exciting and validating experience! All teams received valuable feedback to refine their business strategies and prepare for their next steps. This event was a powerful learning moment, pushing students outside their comfort zones and helping them grow as young entrepreneurs

Matariki Market Combines Culture and Commerce

On Thursday 19 June, seven of our Year 13 Business Studies teams took part in the Pukekohe High School Matariki Event where they sold their products as part of a mini-market. This event was a special chance to celebrate Matariki with the community while gaining hands-on experience in customer service and sales. The students set up stalls alongside food vendors and performers, enjoying the warm and festive atmosphere. They not only made strong sales but also built relationships with customers and received feedback to help grow their businesses. Events like this highlight the practical focus of the Business Studies curriculum at Year 13,

helping students develop skills in communication, problem-solving (many groups need to make more stock ready for their next selling opportunities) and financial literacy.



Culinary Activity for 3 Year 11 Catering Classes

This activity was designed to showcase the skills students have learned from their Unit Standard this Term 2: **Prepare, cook, and present meat in the hospitality industry.**

Each group of students planned their own recipe and they cooked while being evaluated by judges using certain criteria. It was an opportunity for them to apply their skills under pressure and in front of an audience—an essential experience in the hospitality field.



What is Happening in Legal Studies at PHS?

Tuesday 17 June was a really unique day for legal studies students at PHS. The Year 12 and 13 students received a visit from a team of lawyers at Franklin Law, one of our local law firms. When I say a team, it was nearly a football team. Eight (yes eight!) local lawyers gave up most of their day to speak to the three individual law classes at PHS (two year 12s and a large year 13 class). The lawyers all expressed an interest in giving up their time to inspire the next generation of potential lawyers. The visit was inspired by their marketing manager Louise Willis.

Franklin Law has supported PHS in several ways in the past. Firstly, with their sponsorship of the Franklin Law Prize for top Yr13 Legal Studies student. Secondly, through their summer internship programme that many top Yr13 students have benefited from. This gives student work experience alongside a real law firm and mentoring to develop and inspire them for future careers in the law profession. The visit today took that relationship to the next level of community engagement.

Over 80 students spread across three law classes had the opportunity to hear from eight lawyers about the specific branch of law that they worked in and a little of their journey to become a lawyer. The team of eight consisted of practitioners in civil litigation, commercial law, criminal law, family law and personal client law involving trusts, asset and estate planning. The Franklin Law team consisted of a wide variety of experience from about-to-be qualified lawyers through to three of the partners making an appearance (Kelly Jones, Eddie Taia and Gagan Tangri). Two of the team were actually ex-PHS alum (ex-students) and so it was great to see Aleisha Goldsmith nee Collet, (a rising football/hockey star), and Grace Wilcox (ex-Amokura) return to tell our students of their journey from PHS to the working world.

As well, we were able to hear from lawyer/stuntcar driver Petrea Parkhill, Acacia Dewes and Hannah Markham. As (relatively) new lawyers, they were able to inspire students considering embarking on a career in the law profession, which the students learnt could be vast.

An overwhelming message that came through was that passion for your career was more important than academic brilliance. Also that Waikato University was as good as Auckland University (location joke)!

Their law teacher Mr Hughes would like to thank Franklin Law and the individual members of their team for allowing their staff to come and speak. The 13LAW students spend a lot of their lessons grinding away on essays covering a variety of topics such as concepts of justice, elements of crime, legal negligence, human rights, processes for challenging government power, and finally controversial law processes. It was a pleasant change for them to see where this may lead in their futures.





L2 Psychology Research

Our amazing Level 2 Psychology students have been busy conducting real-world cognitive experiments as part of a 4-credit internal assessment. Each student collected data from 20 participants and is presenting their findings the old-school way — handwriting their assessments and hand-drawing graphs to represent their data clearly and creatively.

Most students have explored the classic Stroop Test, investigating how conflicting word and colour combinations affect reaction times. Others have tested whether we remember pictures or words better, while some have examined the impact of music on cognitive performance.

As part of our learning philosophy, all notes and assessments in Level 2 Psychology are completed by hand. This not only strengthens memory and understanding of complex psychological theories, but also reinforces the depth of learning required to excel in the subject.

We're incredibly proud of their effort, curiosity, and commitment to understanding the human mind!

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



NCEA literacy and numeracy common assessment activities

Those year 11, 12 and 13 aakonga who sat the literacy and numeracy exams earlier in the year were able to view their results for the Reading standard at 3pm on **25 June**. Results for the Writing, Numeracy, Te Reo Matatini and te Pangarau standards will be released at 3pm on 14 July.

When results are released, aakonga will be able to access them through the MyNZQA learner loain.

As a school, we would like to congratulate all of our aakonga who have achieved their reading. If your aakonga was not successful we will continue to support them through targeted interventions each week before the next exam sessions in September.

Aakonga who did not achieve one or more of the Literacy or Numeracy standards will be able to download personalised feedback reports as usual.

A taste of Matariki: Culinary Celebration by Year 13 Catering Students



Guided by Yr13 catering teacher Ms. Randhir, each dish was thoughtfully created to reflect the essence of a specific Matariki star, forming an exquisite narrative thread throughout the meal.

The meals commenced with fresh mussels, elegantly bathed in a rich garlic cream sauce and served alongside warm, golden Māori fried bread, a tribute to Waita, the star embodying the ocean's abundant gifts. For the main course, guests indulged in tender smoked horopito lamb chops, artfully paired with roasted kumara and dusted with the aromatic nuances of smoked horopito, all elegantly finished with a vibrant watercress vinaigrette. This dish resonated with the spirit of Tupuanuku, the star that nourishes the sustenance derived from the earth.

The steamed pudding, infused with comforting winter spices, and paired with succulent, seasonal poached pears—a delightful homage to Tupuarangi, the star associated with the bounty of trees and sky.



This enchanting event not only celebrated the stars of Matariki but also showcased the passion and creativity of our students. A gathering of flavours and stories, it was a moment to cherish, reminding us of the beauty of connection—both to our culinary heritage and the cosmos that inspires us.



Outward Bound Scholarship Recipients - June 2025

Three Year 13 students (Jemma Wright, Tess Rennell, Arona Poroa-Waenga) were awarded scholarships to attend the **Outward-Bound New Zealand Whakatipu Course**, in partnership with the **Auckland Business Chamber**.

The 8-day course included sailing, tramping, rock climbing, and high ropes — all designed to build resilience, teamwork, problem solving, leadership, and self-awareness. The scholarship also includes **six months of ongoing mentoring and support**, helping the students apply their learning and continue to grow in preparation for their futures.

Student Reflections

Highlights included sailing, high ropes, sharing marshmallows around the campfire, and the overnight tramp.

Lowlights involved early morning wakeups, cold water challenges, and the frustration of team members not taking responsibility.

Personal growth was evident in the students' increased confidence, patience, adaptability, and willingness to connect with others. They learned to rely on themselves, support one another, step outside their comfort zones, and approach new challenges with a positive and open mindset. They also gained the confidence to speak up and engage more meaningfully with those around them.



Puuhoro 2025



Pukekohe High School has again been able to work with the Puuhoro Trust to teach and mentor Maaori rangitahi. This Puuhoro program serves as a motivator to advance Maaori involvement and success in the Sciences while attending PHS and beyond. Maaori students who are taking STEMM Technology, subjects (Science, Engineering, Mathematics and Maatauranga) into the senior levels and beyond are welcomed into the program at year 11 and supported throughout their studies by the trust.

Puuhoro coordinated weekly sessions involve students working with tutors to assist with their science assessments and studies. There are also

Kaihautuu sessions to deepen the student's connections to their iwi, whanau and whakapapa. For the year 13 students, sessions to introduce tertiary study information to ease the transition to university are also delivered. These sessions help calm any anxiety surrounding leaving school and helps students feel confident and supported as they progress to entering university. Each term, the students attend a wananga at the AUT South Campus to meet with rangitahi from across Auckland and learn from inspiring Maaori to connect and grow as Maaori in the academic worlds.

There will be an information assembly presented to the prospective Year 11 students for 2026 and a recruitment process to identify those that would most benefit from the program (places are capped at 15 each year group 11-13).

Inspiring the Next Generation: GirlBoss Founder Visits PHS

Over 100 female students at Pukekohe High School had the opportunity to hear from Alexia Hilbertidou, the inspiring founder of GirlBoss New Zealand, during a recent school visit.

GirlBoss NZ is a social enterprise dedicated to empowering young women in leadership, entrepreneurship, science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM). Founded by Alexia at just 16 years old, GirlBoss now reaches thousands of students across the country, encouraging young women to break barriers and pursue bold futures.

Born in the north of England, I've carried a lifelong passion for wildlife—especially birds—into everything I do. After completing a degree in ecology and environmental science and a master's in environmental education, I spent years working with UK birdtracking organizations before founding and running several businesses, including a security firm. A dedicated sportsman, I played both league and rugby, and later coached Bombay Junior Rugby and school teams from the 1st XV through to girls' rugby.

Since arriving in New Zealand in 1999, I've held a variety of roles in South Auckland schools before serving as Deputy Principal at Huntly College. At Pukekohe High School, I've channelled my love of the outdoors into leading agriculture and horticulture education, doubling enrolments in these subjects and creating hands-on pathways for students into the primary industries. Under my

leadership, students have planted over 5,000 native trees and around 26 embark annually on the PITO course, with several progressing to agribusiness degrees at Massey and Lincoln. Outside the classroom, I enjoy fishing and birding—currently tracking the local barn owl population—and remain committed to both pro-farming initiatives and environmental conservation.








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Board Elections

Every state and state-integrated school/kura in New Zealand is governed by a school board (formerly known as a board of trustees). The board has overall responsibility and accountability for the school/kura. School boards' legal responsibilities are determined by the Education and Training Act 2020.

Schools elect board members every three years and this year the school triennial election will take place in Term 3. Our election day is Wednesday 10 September 2025. Information will be distributed to all families with details about the nomination process. Nominations will close at 12pm on Wednesday 6 August 2025. Nominations and voting all takes place online. Watch out for emails from the returning officer returningofficer@myschoolelection.nz) to check that your contact details are correct.

The Pukekohe High School Board is made up of 5 parent -elected representatives, a staff representative voted in by staff and a student representative voted in by students. As the school runs mid -term elections for continuity purposes, only 3 of the 5 parent- elected positions on the Board are up for re-election in September. The other 2 positions are up for reelection in March 2027.




