Start of Year Dates

Thursday 29 January

Year 9 students will have their first day at school. This will start with a poowhiri at 9:00am followed by activities throughout the day in Te Maahuri (form) classes with Kaihaapai (form teachers). Whaanau are warmly invited to attend the poowhiri. The day will finish at the regular time of 3:15pm.

Year 9 students will receive their timetables on this day and will be orientated around the school.

Friday 30 January

All year levels will be at school this day. Students will be in their Te Maahuri classes until 12:55pm when they will be dismissed.

Monday 2 February

All students are on timetable from this day.

Poowhiri Kawa and Tikanga | Protocols and Practices

A Poowhiri (Pōhiri) is a traditional welcome ceremony which brings newcomers or visitors into a space, organisation or marae. The Poowhiri process is about making connections and bringing groups together as one with a common purpose.

The start-of-year Poowhiri at Pukekohe High School involves the following protocols:

- Manuwhiri (visitors / new people) gather at the gate (please don't come on-site until you are called as a group).
- Karanga – a traditional call of welcome
- Whakaeke – the visiting group enter (women in front, males behind), and take their places (Males seated in front, women behind).

- Karakia and Hiimene – an opening prayer or traditional incantation followed by a hymn or song.
- Whaikoorero – a series of speeches by speakers on each side
- Waiata – each group stands to sing a song to support their speaker
- Hariruu – greeting (hongi – pressing of noses) or handshake
- Kai – everyone has some food to whakanoa (transition from the protocol to everyday activity).

Parking and Gathering

To avoid congestion, **please do not park on Harris Street** during the morning of the poowhiri. On-street parking is available on John Street, Roulston Street and Graham Street.

Gather along Harris Street – at the start of the poowhiri, you will be called to **enter via Gate two**. Please be aware of the movement of traffic and school buses on Harris Street and do not stand on the road.

You may gather in the carpark at gate 3 (main entrance) but please do not come onto the quad or school grounds until after the poowhiri – this ensures we follow poowhiri protocols.

- School will start at 9:00am each day. There will be no late starts.
- School will finish at 3:15pm everyday with the exception of Wednesday (see next point)
- Years 11-13 students will finish their day every Wednesday at the end of period 4 (1:55pm). Years 9 and 10 students will finish their day on Wednesday at 3:15pm.
- Rostered assemblies will take place for year levels and houses across the week during Te Maahuri time.

- Busses will continue to leave at the usual time in the afternoon (3:35pm). Senior students who need to catch an afternoon bus on Wednesdays can be accommodated in the school library should they need to stay on the school site between 1:55-3:15pm.

Our MANA values help unite our diverse school community and all that we do as a kura. We look forward to exploring these values over the course of the year with our new students.



Te Maahuri Pastoral Programme

Following community and staff consultation in 2024 and 2025, the implementation of a new pastoral care curriculum at Pukekohe High School has been built into our timetable for 2026. The name Te Maahuri is drawn from the whakataukii "Te piko o te maahuri teeraa te tipu o te rakau". The name Te Maahuri is best understood within the context of this whakataukii - the way in which the sapling, the student, is nurtured determines how the tree, all that they can be, will grow.

Te Maahuri is a space in every student's timetable (replacing Whaanau Roopuu/form time) which intends to provide dedicated time for connection, koorero (through academic mentoring), and holistic learning that nurtures the whole young person. Every Te Maahuri class will be led by a Kaihaapai, a staff member that acts as the students' advocate, champion, and significant adult here at school. It is our hope that through Te Maahuri, our students, whaanau and school will develop educationally powerful relationships for growth, ako, and connection.



Alongside our Te Maahuri programme mentioned above, a significant piece of work is being undertaken next year around the culture of learning at Pukekohe High School. 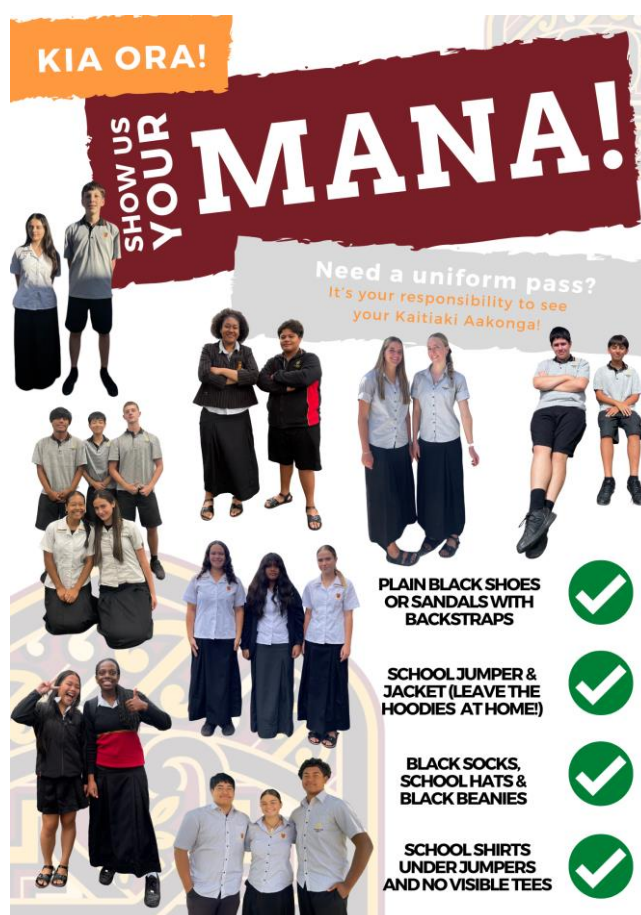
M	MOVE WITH RESPECT Our school, people, physical and digital spaces, and our learning flourish with respect , care, and kindness.
