Pukekohe High School Shines at Young Enterprise Regional Awards

2025 has been another outstanding year of enterprise at Pukekohe High School, celebrating the success of our talented Young Enterprise Scheme teams at the YES Auckland Regional Awards. Three of our student businesses achieved regional recognition, with Patched Up! winning the Excellence in Marketing and Communication Award, and Ahimātao and AllStar Bags impressing judges with their outstanding business pitches. Out of more than 200 teams in South Auckland - and over 1,900 teams across Auckland - our school proudly secured two of the six finalist spots for our region and did an amazing job at showcasing their business journeys this year. A special congratulations also goes to Keira Wilson, who received the prestigious Deloitte Individual of the Year Award for South Auckland, recognising her leadership, innovation, and entrepreneurial spirit.

Each of our teams showcased creativity, cultural awareness, and community values through their business ventures:

- **Patched Up!** with Airah Padilla, Nav Kaur, Keira Wilson, Khayem Libo-on, Cara Rademeyer and Anneka Tapp who upcycled thrifted clothing with stitched-on designs inspired by cultural and trending patterns.
- **Ahimātao** with Ella Bryant, Jessica Cochran, Alysha Daya, Annika Steele who developed a soothing heat and cooling balm designed for athletes which has been a highly popular product amongst their target market.
- **AllStar Bags** with Shauna Kawondera, Joey Ugwa, Ella Banfield, Riddhi Vaidh and Harpreet Bains who custom-designed sports bags that reflect the diversity of our students and proudly display our school values.

We are incredibly proud of all our students who participated in YES this year, demonstrating innovation, teamwork, and confidence as they prepare to take their entrepreneurial skills beyond the classroom.

Co-requisites Results

This initiative was designed to foster leadership, confidence, and industry insight among rangatahi, providing them with direct mentorship from professionals across the tech and innovation landscape. Over the course of the programme, students engaged in workshops, networking events, and one-on-one mentoring sessions that helped them explore career pathways and develop their personal and professional aspirations.

The graduation event was a celebration of their growth, resilience, and vision. Each student shared reflections on their journey, highlighting the impact of cultural connection, mentorship, and the importance of representation in shaping their future.

The Te Ara Hihiko Panel is more than a programme—it's a movement. It represents a commitment to nurturing Māori and Pasifika talent and ensuring their voices are heard in spaces where decisions are made and futures are shaped.

We are incredibly proud of our graduates and hopeful that this programme will continue to grow in the years to come, inspiring more young leaders to step forward and shine.

Measles

- Measles is circulating and is very contagious. There is now measles in Northland, Auckland, Manawatu, Nelson and Wellington, and we expect further cases across New Zealand.
- Watch out for symptoms – fever, cough, runny nose, sore eyes, and a blotchy rash: [Measles – Health New Zealand](#)
- Anyone with measles symptoms must stay at home and should seek urgent advice by ringing their doctor or Healthline on 0800 611 116.
- Anyone who is closely exposed to a measles case must stay at home. Health New Zealand will provide individuals with advice on a case-by-case basis (including when they can leave quarantine at home).
- Health New Zealand is actively working with the schools that currently have measles cases.

- Anyone born between 1969 and 2004 may have only received one vaccine dose and might not be fully protected. It's safe to get extra doses. A free vaccine can be booked online or via the Vaccination Helpline on 0800 28 29 26.
